

4-H is a community of young people across America who are learning leadership, citizenship and life skills. 4-H is about having fun, learning, exploring and discovering. In 4-H, young people make new friends, develop new skills, become leaders and help shape their communities.

More than 65,000 Texas youth are enrolled members of 4-H community clubs in Texas. Another 850,000 Texas youth get involved in 4-H through special educational opportunities at school, in after school programs, or at neighborhood or youth centers. These youth live in cities, suburbs, small towns and rural communities.

4-H gives them a chance to pursue their own interests - from photography to computers, from building rockets to raising sheep. They go places: to camp, to state and national conferences. They learn to be leaders and active citizens.

In 4-H clubs, they serve as officers and learn to conduct meetings, handle club funds and facilitate group decision-making. They give back to their communities. 4-H members get involved in volunteer projects to protect the environment, mentor younger children and help people who are less fortunate.

Getting the Most Out of 4-H

4-H Age Guidelines

Members are divided into four age groups:

Clover Kid Kindergarten (age 5) to 2nd grade

lunior ages 8 (and in 3rd grade) to 10 *

Intermediate ages 11 to 13 *

Senior ages 14 to 18 *

as of August 31, 2014

Clover Kids can participate in all County 4-H activities, including the Foods and Creative Arts Department at the Lee County Junior Livestock Show. However, Clover Kids are not eligible to participate in auction departments of LCJLS.

Enrollment and Fees

The 4-H year begins each September 1. Enrollments become "inactive" at the conclusion of each year and must be reactivated.

Members must re-enroll each year and pay the Participation Fee in order to participate in the 4-H program, Lee County Junior Livestock Show and major livestock shows. Enrollment can be completed on-line through the 4-H CONNECT enrollment program at:

Participation Fee:*

\$20/member, if enrolled before Oct. 31 \$25/member, if enrolled after Oct. 31

Parents Complete Enrollment

Adult Volunteers help provide transportation to meetings and camps, assist with meetings and project groups, as well as many other duties. Each Club has a Club Manager(s) who works with the Club Officers, Adult Volunteers and Members to make the most of the 4-H experience.

All adults who volunteer in the 4-H program must complete an enrollment through 4-H CONNECT, just as

any 4-H Member does. Beginning in 2014, adults will be assessed an annual \$5 volunteer application fee. This fee will pay for the volunteer screening. Screenings are conducted every three years, though the \$5 volunteer application fee will be assessed annually.

Once the volunteer's profile becomes active, a volunteer certificate will be accessible via download in 4 -H CONNECT and will include a small card that can be cut out to be carried in the volunteer's wallet.

Get Involved

As a 4-H Member or Adult Volunteer, you will be involved in a local 4-H club, attend monthly meetings, volunteer for committees and stay informed of what is going on in your club. Start a Project

During enrollment, 4-H members are asked to select projects of interest. When you start your 4-H experience, you may want to select one or two projects. The more years you are in 4-H, the more projects you can usually handle.

4-H projects can be conducted throughout the 4-H year (Sept. 1 - Aug. 31). Certain projects have special activities or contests, so you need to begin some projects at specific times during the year. After you select your projects, contact your Club Manager or the Lee County Extension office for assistance.

Getting the Most Out of 4-H

Complete a Project

After you have selected a project, you are ready to start gaining information and having fun learning about your project. In 4-H, you are asked to do a minimum of six learning experiences to complete a project.

LEARNING EXPERIENCES vary from project to project such as: project meetings with other 4-H'ers and Adult Volunteers; going on tours; attending workshops; reading publications or surfing the Internet.

Many 4-H'ers work on the project with their parents, grandparents or other family members, while other 4-H'ers work on projects with a group of friends. Working through a project from start to finish helps a 4-H member gain skills in carrying out responsibilities, as well as setting and completing goals. See Page 6.

Participate in Activities

Activities are contests or opportunities for 4-H members to demonstrate the skills and knowledge they have gained through their project work. Some of the activities allow a team of 4-H'ers to prepare a presentation, while other activities are for individual contest entry.

Participating in 4-H activities encourages the member to gain public speaking skills and presentation skills that will help them throughout their life.

Other activities available to 4-H'ers are a variety of camps and workshops conducted mainly in the summer. You can learn about leadership, environment, wildlife and fisheries and much more.

Registration for 4-H contests is completed online via 4-H CONNECT. Registration is completed by the family and entry fees are paid for online with a credit/debit card. Families without online access and/or a credit/debit card are asked to contact the Extension office for assistance.

Families are expected to pay for entry fees prior to registrations being approved at the County level.

The Lee 4-H Parent Volunteer Association ("PVA") will make a reimbursement to each family based on the PVA budget and families submitting a "Reimbursement Form" before August 31. The Reimbursement Form is the last page in this handbook.

Reimbursements will be made once, yearly. Reimbursements will be issued based the available budgeted line item for contests and on a sliding scale of percentages; number of reimbursements requested in relation to number of participants and number of contests entered.

Deadline to submit a Reimbursement Form is August 31, 2015.

NEW THIS YEAR!

4-H families will conduct all 4-H contest registrations and pay entry fees online.

Reimbursement of entry fees must be submitted by August 31, 2015. The "Reimbursement Form" is included in this handbook.

Entry fees must be paid ahead of the registration being approved at the County level.

Keep Records

Whenever you spend time working on a project, record your progress. Take notes on the things you learn as well as track your progress with photographs.

Lee County 4-H'ers have the opportunity to complete a record book for recognition at the Annual 4-H Awards Program, held in August, and to be considered for the Gold Star and the I Dare You awards. See Page 11.

Share Information

As a 4-H member, you learn to share with others

the information you have gained through your project experience. This is called LEADERSHIP.

The more years you are involved in a project, the more you will have to share with others. Also, serving as a club officer or a committee member will help increase your leadership skills.

Help Others

The 4-H experience includes helping others. We call our 4-H help, COMMUNITY SERVICE. It is a way to give something back to the community for the continued support of the 4-H Program. Community Service is something that you do for a non-4-H audience without pay or compensation.

Promote 4-H

4-H is the largest youth organization in the country because we are always inviting others to attend. Part of your 4-H experience will be to get others involved in the program. This could mean asking a friend to visit your club meeting or preparing a poster for National 4-H Week. Keep asking others to share in the fun of 4-H.

Fund Raising in Lee County

4-H members and County Clubs assist the Parent Volunteer Association and the 4-H Council with county-wide fund raising. The County 4-H budget needs help and support to make the fund raising activities a success.

Proceeds from fund raising efforts go to fund County 4-H activities, awards and scholarships.

The Fried Chicken Dinner Fund Raiser is the most successful effort for Lee County 4-H. Poinsettias and Pecans are sold simultaneously beginning in October and are delivered approximately the first week in December. Poinsettia and Pecan sales are coordinated

around one pick-up date for easier delivery to your customers.

All animal project exhibitors need to review rules for the specific livestock show they plan to enter, as rules vary between shows. Extension Agents are available to assist in your project management throughout the year. Contact the Extension office to schedule a site visit.

Livestock projects involve raising and caring for live animals while learning about animal health, nutrition, breeding, selection, and marketing. The livestock project offers outstanding opportunities for individuals to gain experience in decision making, record keeping, responsibility, sportsmanship and leadership.

District 9 hosts the Southern Classic in Bryan at the Brazos County Expo Complex. The **Southern Classic** is designed to provide an educational opportunity for 4-H families needing experience in the show ring. The weekend includes educational programs mixed with competitive experiences designed to prepare youth for their ultimate experience, "The County Youth Livestock Show". The Southern Classic is open to all 4-H families.

Clothing and Textiles

For those participating in Clothing and Textiles (January through March), the 4-H member will complete six learning experiences with the assistance of club leaders and/or parents. These experiences can be completed in project group meetings or individual study.

You do not have to sew to complete the project. 4-H'ers can select experiences to fit their needs, such as buying ready-to-wear, wardrobe planning, clothing construction, wardrobe care, modeling, grooming, fibers and much more. They can also choose to sew in addition to other experiences. The experiences prepare the 4-H'er for project activities.

Project Activities:

County Fashion Show

In the Spring, the County Fashion Show allows members to show off their skills. The 4-H member can either construct a garment or select a ready-to-wear outfit to model. Participants submit infor-mation about their selection prior to the Show. During the Show, judges ask questions related to the project experiences.

Fabric and Fashion Design

The Fabric and Fashion Design competition is for those interested in designing fabrics, apparel or accessories. A 4-H member may submit a portfolio (a drawing and description of their design) for any of three categories: accessories, apparel or textiles. Portfolios will be judged during Fashion Show activities. Special project information is available for 4-H'ers interested in studying design.

Special Opportunities:

Clothing & Textiles Advisory Board

The Clothing & Textiles Advisory Board is made up of Senior 4-H members, adult leaders, County Extension Agents and industry representatives. Their task is to promote the goals of the 4-H Clothing Program. The

Board may review project materials and activities, recommending program direction, special activities, new materials and competitive events.

Membership on the Board gives you a voice in planning future of 4-H Clothing and Textiles events. Applications to the Board are due before December 31 for a two-year term beginning in June. Additional information is available at the Extension office.

A 4-H member will have many opportunities to make speeches. These challenging occasions will help 4-H'ers to develop communication skills they will use throughout their life. Effective speakers are not necessarily polished or perfect. Instead, they are energetic, direct and warm human beings who are knowledgeable about their subject matter and area involved with their audiences. Good speakers are not born, they are developed. Each presentation should be a learning experience.

The Extension Agents can help 4-H members prepare an outline using the resources collected. Younger members may wish to write out their entire speeches, while experienced members may just need to prepare a detailed outline.

4-H members wanting to participate in the District Roundup should to contact the Extension office as soon as possible. District Roundup will be held in May. Preparation begins early.

4-H members will have the opportunity to present their demonstration/talk to the Extension Agents during a club meeting or individual conference prior to the District event.

Educational Presentations and Public Speaking can be done in many different areas. Categories are updated from year-to-year. The best way to see all the categories, along with detailed rules related to each, is to refer to the current Texas 4-H Roundup Guide.

Healthy Lifestyles

In October and November, 4-H Club leaders and parents will assist interested 4-H'ers in participating in the Food and Nutrition Project. 4-H'ers complete six learning experiences pertaining to food and nutrition, learning about nutrition, food choices, menu planning, food preparation, buying, food safety, careers, cultural influences and much more.

These experiences can be completed in Project Group meetings or in individual study with parents and leaders. The experiences prepare the 4-H'ers for project activities.

Project Activities:

Food Challenge

The 4-H Food Challenge is a contest that allows 4-H members to demonstrate their culinary knowledge and skills. From a set of predetermined ingredients provided, teams of 3 to 5 4-H members must develop a recipe and prepare the dish within 40 minutes. Teams then make a presentation to a judging panel, explaining the preparation steps, serving size, food safety concerns, nutrition value and cost of the dish.

Food Show

The Food Show offers 4-H members an opportunity to show off skills and knowledge gained in the Food and Nutrition Project. 4-H'ers submit their recipe and project information sheet prior to the Show.

For the Show, each participant prepares a dish at home and brings it to the contest. During the judging, 4-H'ers are asked questions on nutrition, food preparation and meal planning. A tasting party follows the judging for everyone to enjoy.

Food & Nutrition Quiz Bowl

The Food & Nutrition Quiz Bowl involves teams of three to four 4-H members which compete against other District teams by answering questions on Food and Nutrition project topics. All team members must be in the same 4-H age group.

In the Fall, meat judging teams are organized and begin training. Anyone interested in meat judging should contact the County Extension office by October 1. Competition is held at the District, State and National levels.

Photography Contest

The Texas 4-H Photography Contest encourages selfexpression and allows youth to demonstrate skills learned in the area of photography, including the use of photographic equipment and process of photographs. Members have an opportunity to show off

their talents in District and State 4-H photography contests. Entries are submitted on-line through 4-H CONNECT.

Contest rules allow each County to enter one picture per category. Categories can change from year to year. Always review the listing of categories when considering your entry.

Record Books

Record keeping is a very valuable skill taught to members of the Texas 4-H program. Members are encouraged to keep project records and have these records reviewed annually by submitting a Texas 4-H Record Book.

The primary purpose of completing a Record Book are for a young person to develop the skills necessary to set goals, work toward achieving those goals, reflect on their experiences, and set new and higher goals for themselves.

A secondary benefit is to prepare young people for the process of completing quality academic scholarship applications.

The completed 4-H Record Book must be submitted to the Lee County Extension office in early June. Each 4-

H'er submitting a Record Book at the County level are recognized at the Annual Awards Program in August.

First place books in each age division will advance to District level competition. Senior 4-H'ers who place first in District will advance to the State Record Book competition.

Awards and Recognition

County 4-H Awards

The Lee County 4-H Council and Parent Volunteers Association host the Annual 4-H Awards Program. 4-H'ers are recognized for their 4-H participation during the previous year. It is also a way to promote the variety of opportunities in 4-H and to recognize more 4-H members.

I Dare You Award

The *I Dare You* award is offered in recognition of excellence in character and well-balanced personal development, as well as demonstrated leadership of Senior 4-H'ers. In August of each year, Senior 4-H'ers who have timely completed record books will receive applications for the award.

Gold Star Award

The *Gold Star Award* is the highest County achievement award and is intended to be received only once in a member's 4-H career. Counties receive an award quota based on the number of Senior 4-H members.

The award will be presented to the most deserving young person(s) without regard to gender. The following requirements must be met:

- The member must be at least 15 years old at the time of application and have completed at least 3 years in 4-H, including the current year.
- The 4-H member must timely submit a Record book in the year he or she is to be considered for the award.
- The 4-H member must have completed projects in three different project areas.

National 4-H Week

October 5 - 11, 2014 is National 4-H Week. All Lee County 4-H Clubs are encouraged to promote the 4-H program throughout the year, but should plan something special for the National 4-H Week.

In years past, clubs have prepared posters and exhibits. There are several types of fliers available through the Extension office which can be used for your promotional activities, and the Extension office has plenty of 4-H and related computer graphics that might be useful for your displays.



Scholarships

Local Scholarships

Parent Volunteers Association — Each year, the Lee County 4-H Parent Volunteers Association offers scholarships to eligible graduating seniors. Applications are due to the Lee County Extension office by April 1. Recipients are notified in May.

Applications are available at the Lee County Extension office.

Lee County Jr. Livestock Show — The Lee County Junior Livestock Show awards one scholarship to each school district in Lee County. Applications are available through your school counselor's office.

Go-Texan Scholarship — The Lee County Go-Texan Committee offers scholarships to youth as part of the Houston Livestock Show activities. Applications are available through your school counselor's office.

Thousands of dollars in college scholarships are awarded to 4-H members annually. There are local scholarships as well as many statewide opportunities. Scholarship applications are usually available as early as December. Visit with your school's Counselor for assistance in applying for scholarships in many different areas.



Entry Deadline — January 30, 2015

Work Days — All exhibitors, including cake exhibitors, must participate in a Work Day at the Show Barn. Exhibitors whose entry sells in the sale, must also participate in one Work Day after the sale. A penalty will be assessed to any exhibitor, for each work day missed, and also for failure to clean their pen or stall prior to being released on sale day.

<u>Project Requirements</u> — In order to be eligible to receive prize and/or sale money, each 4-H'er must submit the following items to the Extension office:

- Thank-You Note a Thank-You Note written to each Buyer, in an addressed and pre-stamped envelope
- Delivery Slip Exhibitors of meat rabbits, poultry and cakes
 that make the Sale are required to have the Buyer sign and date a
 delivery slip. Delivery date is set at Buyer's request.

These items must be submitted to the County Extension office by 5:00 pm April 24, 2015. Prize and/or sale money will be withheld until Thank-You Notes and Delivery Slips are turned in.

Foods and Creative Arts — All youth can enter the Foods and Creative Arts division at the LCJLS. Complete rules for the Foods and Creative Arts division are included in the LCJLS Rules section of this Handbook.

Average Daily Gain

Average Daily Gain (ADG) is the amount of weight gained per day by the animal over a given period of time. If your animal does not make the minimum weight or is overweight, then you may not be able to participate at the County Junior Livestock Show. By keeping track of your ADG every two weeks, you can determine if your animal is in the weight range required for the stock show.

For example, an animal weighs 800 pounds on January 1 and weighs 841.5 pounds on January 15; the animal gained 41.5 pounds in 14 days.

 $41.5 \text{ lbs.} \div 14 \text{ days} = 2.96 \text{ lbs./day}$

total pounds number of

gained ÷ days fed = Avg. Daily Gain

Show Weight

Show weights are the weight ranges for each specific species. Only animals within show weights will be permitted to be show. A 3-pound weight tolerance will be allowed on the minimum and maximum weight limit; meat rabbits are allowed a 3 oz. tolerance per pen.

Animals within the tolerance will be recorded at the minimum or maximum weight.

Meat Rabbits 10 lbs. - 15 lbs. per pen

Market Lambs at least 100 lbs.

Market Hogs at least 220 lbs., but not over 280 lbs.

Market Steers minimum 1,000 lbs.

Market Goats between 70 lbs. to 125 lbs.

Weigh-In Countdown

Based on the ADG calculated for your livestock project, feed can be adjusted according to the number of days before official stock show weigh-in.

Major Livestock Shows

Major livestock show projects of steers, market lambs, meat goats and swine must be validated and eartagged in the months of June, October and November. Ear tags for the major shows must be ordered prior to tagging dates. Market poultry orders are due in September and October for major livestock shows.

Watch the 4-H newsletter and 4-H newspaper articles for information and updates regarding tag order dates and validation dates.

The **Quality Counts** verification process requires junior exhibitors to pass an on-line test that measures their knowledge on quality assurance and character education content items.

The *Quality Counts* program has now been in existence statewide for several years. Over this time, it has reached an average of 30,000 youth per year through the 4-H and FFA Programs. The program outcomes clearly demonstrate youth being more knowledgeable of best management practices associated with livestock projects. More importantly, the program's impact has demonstrated positive changes in personal character attributes as well as adoption of livestock best management practices.

Over these many years, *Quality Counts* has been supported and endorsed by every major livestock show in Texas. These livestock shows have been instrumental in helping market the program statewide and have also been a strong partner regarding the educational content developed for the *Quality Counts* program. In addition, these livestock shows have fully endorsed this verification process.

Youth are able to go online to take the test and become verified. A verification number will need to be provided at the time of making an official entry into a Texas major livestock show. Thus, youth will need to have completed and passed the test before the major livestock show's entry deadline. A passing score has been determined to be 80%.

Youth educators and the major livestock shows in Texas believe strongly in *Quality Counts*. Collectively, they are confident that this significant step of requiring youth to be "Quality Counts Verified" will strengthen and enhance the youth livestock program in Texas.

Frequently Asked Questions

How often must I be "verified"?

Exhibitors need to be verified once as a junior and once again as a senior. Junior is 8 years old and in the 3rd grade through 13 (as of August 31, 2014). Seniors is 14 years old or older (as of August 31, 2014).

How do I become verified?

pass the online test with 80% correct answers (8 out 10)

How many times can I take the test?

as many times as necessary to achieve an 80% score

What happens when I pass the test?

You are given a Quality Counts verification number and the online system allows you to print a personalized certificate.

How do I learn the material needed to pass the test?

All of the material is available online, through the on-line teaching system "Texas Trail".

Will Quality Counts Verification be needed for Breeding Entries?

Yes. Quality Counts Verification will be needed for all Junior Livestock Show entries at Major shows, including breeding animals.

What do I do with the Quality Counts verification number?

Hold on to the number and use it when asked for by stock shows as part of entry requirement.

Can someone else use my number?

No. The number is tied back to your name in the database available to stock shows and County Extension Agents. When the number is entered into the system, only your name appears.

Do I need a separate verification numbers for 4-H and FFA?

When you take the test, you have the option to select "both FFA and 4-H" as your affiliated organizations; that one number will qualify you for both organizations.

Objectives

- 1. To acquire an understanding of scientific livestock production, management practice, and to acquire skill in executing these practices through the experience of selecting and caring for projects.
- 2. To provide a business experience and an insight into values and principles of purchasing and selling projects.
- To encourage integrity, sportsmanship and cooperation through participation in a county livestock show.

General Rules

- 1. The show will be supervised by the Board of Directors of the Lee County Junior Livestock Show, County Agents, and Agriculture Science Teachers.
- 2. This show reserves to the Directors of the Lee County Junior Livestock Show the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences arising out of or in connection with or incidental to the show, and the right to amend and/or add to these rules as its judgement may determine. An exhibitor who violates any of these following rules will forfeit all privileges and premium and be subject to penalty as the board of directors may order.
- 3. The Lee County Junior Livestock Show will in no case be responsible for any loss, injury, or damage to, occasioned by or arising from any project exhibited.
- 4. ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS: Departments A-L are open to youth meeting the requirements in rule 4 as well as other rules listed in the general rules and the department sections. Department M is an open department with requirements listed under the department section.
 - (a) MEMBERSHIP: An active member of a F.F.A. chapter at Giddings, Dime Box or Lexington schools or an active member of any Lee County 4-H Club. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the third through the twelfth grade, and must meet the 4-H, or F.F.A. meeting requirements.
 - (b) MEETING ATTENDANCE: Attend four regular meetings of the current enrollment period for their FFA chapter or 4-H Club prior to March 1, 2015(FFA enrollment begins with first meeting after school starts and 4-H enrollment begins with the first meeting in August
 - (c) RESIDENCE OR SCHOOL ENROLLMENT: Exhibitors must be currently enrolled in a Lee County School or reside in Lee County and be enrolled in school in the 12th grade or below, and not over 19 years old as of January 1, 2015 unless the student is currently being served under the Individual Disabilities Education Act, Pt B
 - (d) SCHOLASTIC ELIGIBILITY: The Lee County Junior Livestock Show Board of Directors will follow policies as set out by the Texas Education Agency. If an exhibitor is determined ineligible on Wednesday, March 25, 2015, then the entry is ineligible.
 - (e) EXEMPTIONS and SUBSTITUTIONS: Exhibitors involved in school sponsored or school related activities, or illness, considered beyond the normal scheduled activities, may be considered to be exempted or allowed a substitute exhibitor if properly approved by the Board of Directors. Each request will be considered on an individual basis. A request must be made in writing by the sponsor and signed by the Principle to the Board of Directors at least a month prior to the show or as soon as the situation arises. Substitutes should be siblings or someone from the same club in the same age range if possible. The Department superintendent must be informed as to who the substitute is prior to show date.
 - (f) SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER: All exhibitors must have a social security number. (Exceptions, i.e. foreign exchange students, will be addressed on an individual basis in accordance with applicable standards as prescribed by IRS regulations. Such exceptions must be brought to the attention of the Lee County Junior Livestock show Board of Directors immediately after the student signs up for membership in the 4-H or FFA.)
 - (g) **ENTRY DEADLINE**: Entry deadline is **January 30, 2015** A copy of the cake recipe must be attached to the entry. An alphabetized SUMMARY SHEET FOR EACH 4-H Club or FFA Chapter must be submitted by the CEA or AST along with their entries.
 - (h) ANIMAL OWNERSHIP: All entries must be owned by the exhibitor by the beginning of the feeding period. The exhibitor must continuously and personally feed and care for his/her animals under the supervision of their County Extension Agent or Agricultural Science Teacher. Feeding projects on other than the exhibitor's place of residence must be requested in PERSON by the EXHIBITOR and PARENT(S) prior to the beginning of the feeding period or at the first LCJLS board of directors meeting after validation, or immediately should the need become necessary. These requests will be considered on an individual basis and will be approved only if a valid need exists. Approved projects will be closely supervised by the exhibitor's CEA or AST and monitored by an appointed Board member.
 - (i) VALIDATION DATES: Exhibitors must notify the County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher of their intent to show projects by the beginning of the feeding period as follows:

(j) VALIDATION REQUIREMENTS: All validations will be done at the same place and time for each department. An exhibitor can validate a maximum of four (4) animals per exhibitor in each division, excluding rabbits, chickens, and commercial heifers, but must exhibit the animals validated in his/her name or immediate family. Exhibitors will be responsible for handling the animals at validation. Special requirements:

<u>Steers</u> - must be validated on September 14, 2014, by an ear tag and nose print at the owner's expense, \$2 per head. Steers, which have been properly validated in Lee County, in the exhibitor's name, with a current state validation tag, are eligible and do not have to be retagged, however, they must be brought to the county validation on September 14, 2014.. All animals must be presented at the county validation in order to be eligible to show at the LCJLS.

<u>Crossbred Heifers</u> - must be validated September 14, 2014 by an ear tag and tattooed, \$2 per head. <u>Commercial Bred Market Heifers</u> & <u>Commercial Open Market Heifers</u> - must be validated September 14, 2014 by an ear tag and tattooed, \$2 per head.

<u>Lambs</u>- must be validated on Thursday, November 6, 2014, by an ear tag and nose print at the owner's expense, \$2 per head. Lambs which have been properly validated in Lee County, in the exhibitors name with a current state validation tag, are eligible and do not have to be retagged, however, they must be brought to the county validation on Thursday, November 6, 2014. All animals must be presented at the county validation in order to be eligible to show at the LCJLS.

Meat Goats - must be validated Thursday, November 6, 2014 by an ear tag and tattoo, at the owner's expense, \$2 per head. Goats which have been properly validated in Lee County, in the exhibitors name, with a current state validation tag, are eligible and do not have to be retagged, however, they must be brought to the county validation on Thursday, November 6, 2014 and be tattooed. All animals must be presented at the county validation in order to be eligible to show at the LCJLS.

Meat Rabbits - must be validated with an official tattoo on February 22, 2015.

<u>Broilers</u> - Chick orders and money must be turned in to each exhibitor's respective Agriculture Science Teachers or Lee County Extension Office by December 5, 2014. All chicks come from the same .hatch. Only exhibitors who ordered chicks prior to the deadline date are eligible to show.

<u>Swine</u> - must be validated Thursday, December 11, 2014 by an ear tag, at the owner's expense, \$2 per head. Exhibitors will be responsible for holding and presenting their pigs to the validation committee for tagging. Each pig's ear notch will be recorded by the EXHIBITOR on a form provided to the CEA and AST'S PRIOR to validation. This form must be brought with each pig and presented at the validation. The ear notches will be verified and matched with the appropriate ear tag by the validation committee. Pigs which have been properly validated,in Lee County, in the exhibitor's name, with a current state validation tag, are eligible and do not have to be retagged, however, they must be brought to the county validation on Thursday, December 11, 2014. ALL animals must be presented at the county validation in order to be eligible to show at the LCJLS.

- (k) LOST EAR TAGS: Lost ear tags must be reported to the Agriculture Science Teachers or the County Extension Agent immediately. The AST;s or CEA, will notify the Board of Directors which animals need to be retagged. .Commercial heifers which have lost tags may be brought to either the Dime Box, Giddings or Lexington Vet Clinics at the date and time designated. Exhibitors who had validated heifers will be notified as to the date and time and may then choose from any of the three options. All other animals will be retagged prior to weigh in at show barn on March 25, 2015. Each retag will be charged \$2.00.
- (I) ENTRY FORM DEADLINE AND FEES: All Junior Livestock Show entry forms must be filled out completely and turned in to the County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher by January 30, 2015. No late entries will be accepted. 4-H entry blanks must be signed by County Extension Agent. F.F.A. entries must be signed by the Agriculture Science Teachers. All registration papers must be in the name of the exhibitor by the minimum ownership date. Each exhibitor may enter any market division, including open and bred commercial market heifers, but only two entries may be shown and only those two may be brought onto the fairgrounds. Once an animal/cake is unloaded, it cannot be replaced by another animal/cake. Failure to comply with this rule will result in disqualification of all entries for that exhibitor. Entry fees for Junior Show are as follows:

Market animals/cake department	\$25 per head/pen/cake
Breeding cattle	\$25 per head
Breeding rabbits	\$5 per head
Commercial market heifers	\$25 per pen

- (m) HEALTH REQUIREMENTS: No animal showing evidence of disease shall be permitted on the show grounds. Livestock must comply with the entry requirements as set out by the Texas Animal Health Commission. All medicated feedstuff and drugs must be withdrawn in accordance with the label for the product used or fed. Only a licensed Veterinarian may administer any type of medicated feedstuff, drug or antibiotic in compliance with the TAHC guidelines once animals are on premises.
- (n) ARRIVAL AND RELEASE OF ANIMALS: All animals must be checked in by the date and time as published in the stock show schedule prior to the show. Entries arriving late are subject to disqualification. All animals must be checked out with the appropriate department superintendent before they are loaded from the premises. No animals are to be moved until completion of the sale, except for breeding show and non-sale market animal entries.
- (o) WEIGHING OF ANIMALS: All market animals will be weighed on the show grounds by a qualified person appointed by the Lee County Junior Livestock Show Board. Weighing will begin at the time shown on the schedule. Each species will weigh in the order designated by the superintendent of that department. All hogs will be weighed on one scale. Sheep, followed by goats will be weighed on another scale, followed by steers on another scale.. Each exhibitor must be present at the time of their weigh-in unless prior approval is received from the Board of Directors. Animals must be brushed clean when presented for weighing. The animal's weight will be recorded on the back of each exhibitor card. Ownership declared when the animal is presented at weigh-in (before entering the scale) is FINAL. Only animals within show weights will be permitted to be shown. A three (3) pound weight tolerance will be allowed on the minimum and maximum weight limit. (except for meat rabbits-which will be allowed a 3 oz tolerance per pen) Animals within the tolerance will be recorded at the minimum or maximum weight. The official weight will be final. Any discrepancy on the weight must be resolved before leaving the scale area.--no re-weighs will be allowed. Animals which have officially weighed-out may be removed from the barn at the time designated in the schedule. Animals will be shrunk 3% only for the resale weight.
- (p) CLEAN-UP REQUIREMENT: All exhibitors, including cake exhibitors, will be expected to participate in one work day assigned to their club or chapter prior to the show. Exhibitors 12 years of age or less must be accompanied by an adult. Exhibitors whose entry sells in the sale must also participate in one workday, assigned to their club or chapter, after the sale. Exhibitors must personally sign in with their designated club leader or advisor. Additionally, after the sale, on sale day all shavings, bedding, and any other material must be removed, bagged and put into a designated space. Exhibitors must have the **Department Superintendent** inspect their pen or stall **at the conclusion of the freezer sale**. County Agents and the FFA advisors will be responsible for supplying the board a list of their members who had failed to comply with this rule. A \$100 penalty will be assessed to any exhibitor for each workday missed and also for failure to clean their pen or stall prior to being released on sale day.
- (q) SHOWING: Showing of unethically fit livestock is prohibited, .Drench guns, which have been approved by the Dept. Superintendent, may be used; however, this does not include pumps, hoses, tubes, etc. All cattle must be halter broken. Any unruly animal will be barred from the show. Each exhibitor must show his own entries, unless prior approval is received from the board of directors. Each exhibitor is responsible for the care of his/her animals and the cleanliness of pen and stalls. Each exhibitor is responsible for feeding and watering equipment.
- (r) THANK YOU LETTERS: A thank you letter must be written for any awards and sale items and turned in to the Agriculture Science Teacher or County Extension Agent in an addressed and self stamped envelope prior to receiving their checks.
- (s) JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW COMPETITION: Exhibitors are allowed to compete in only one county junior livestock show per calendar year.
- 5. JUDGING: The judge will place all entries in each class, 1,2,3,4, etc., except in department M. All first place entries in each class will compete for the Grand Champion. The second place entry in the class from which the Grand Champion was selected will be eligible to compete for Reserve Champion.
- 6. INTERFERENCE WITH JUDGING: If any exhibitor in any way interferes with the judging or shows disrespect to the judge or show, the department superintendent shall demand a proper apology from such exhibitor and the Board of Directors may withhold any premiums which may have been awarded and not allow the exhibitor to sell. **NO ELECTRONIC DEVICES DURING JUDGING**
- 7. PROTESTS: A protest must be made in writing, accompanied by a \$250.00 deposit, to the Chairman of the Board of Directors immediately after the occasion for protest arises. The deposit fee will be refunded if the protest is sustained by the Board of Directors.

- 8. PRIZE MONEY: Prize money for breeding class entries will be awarded according to the prorated scale for each division.
- 9. SALE: Approximately 215 lots will sell. The following maximum number of lots may be eligible to be sold in 2015. 24 steers, 80 hogs, 20 lambs, 30 meat goats, 7 pens of bred commercial market heifers, 12 pens of open commercial market heifers, 15 pens of broilers, 12 pens of rabbits, 12 youth cakes, and 3 decorated cakes. The number selling in each class will be determined by the percent of the actual number of animals/cakes shown in each class, based on the total number sold in that division. This is determined by multiplying the percent of selling animals/cakes (which is determined by dividing the total number of animals/cakes selling in that division by the number of animals/cakes eligible to show in that division.) by the number of animals/cakes in that class. If the whole numbers do not add up to the total number eligible to sell, then the class(s) with the highest decimal number after the whole number will be the next to be added to the sale. If still tied, the following order will be used to break the tie. Heavy weight class, followed by the light heavy weight class, followed by middle weight class, followed by light weight class etc. (heavy to light), followed by the cross class (heavy to light weight). Ties with cakes will be broken by adding to the sale, the class with the highest number of entries. If still tied, it shall be broken by selecting the chocolate, fruit and misc, in that order. A minimum of 60% of the eligible sale animals in each class (rounded up to the whole number) may be eligible to sell in the "regular sale." Only placing entries are eligible to sell. No breeding class entries will be sold. The sale will progress in the following order: steers, hogs, lambs, goats, bred commercial market heifers, open commercial market heifers, broilers, meat rabbits, youth cakes and decorated youth cakes. They will sell with grand and reserve champion selling first, followed by weight department champion. No entry will be allowed to be sold at a price higher than the Grand Champion of their department. Furthermore, no entry other than the Grand Champion will be allowed to be sold at a price higher than the Reserve Champion. No freezer animal/cake can sell for more than ten dollars less than the lowest priced animal/cake of its department in the regular sale. All eligible placing entries must sell in the sale. An exhibitor may sell two entries in the regular and/or freezer sale. Animals will sell in the order in which they place. All exhibitors with entries in the sale must personally sell their own entries unless otherwise authorized by the Board of Directors prior to sale date. A 7% commission will be collected on all entries sold.. Add-ons will not be allowed in the sale. All sales are final. Animals sold at resale immediately become the responsibility of the resale buyer. Only animals placing in the sale will be allowed to sell in the sale
- 10. If an animal places and becomes eligible for the sale, that animal becomes property of the Lee County Junior Livestock Show and is ineligible to show at any other market show.
- 11. SCHOLARSHIP FUND: The Scholarship Fund is administered and funded by the Lee County Junior Livestock Show. No additional commission will be charged.
- 12. DECORATIONS: No paint, glitter, glue or any other substance that adheres to the animal may be used for decorations at the sale. The animal must be in its natural state.
- 13. SHOWMANSHIP AWARDS: An award will be given for steers, hogs, lambs, goats, rabbits, **broilers** and junior breeding beef showmanship. Showmanship will be broken down into a "Junior" and "Senior" Division. Junior Showmanship: Exhibitors in the 8th grade and below. Senior Showmanship: Exhibitors in the 9th grade and above. The showmanship winner will be determined in special classes following the judging of each division. In order for an exhibitor to be eligible to compete for a showmanship award, he or she must own and show his/her own entry. Exhibitor must show the animal exhibited by exhibitor in the regular class. Market Class showmanship contestants will be selected by a judge. Any exhibitor may compete in other areas.
- 14. HERDSMAN AWARD: The Department Superintendent, or designated person(s), will select a commercial heifer exhibitor to receive a "Herdsman" award. The Herdsmen Award will be broken down into a "Junior" and "Senior" Division. Junior Herdsmen: Exhibitors in the 8th grade and below. Senior Herdsmen: Exhibitors in the 9th grade and above the award will be based on conformity to the rules, housekeeping, neatness and presentation.
- 15. No students will be allowed to remain on the fairgrounds overnight without their parents.
- 16. All animals must be fed and cared for daily. No animal is allowed to be removed from the barn unless approved by the Department Superintendent or the Board of Directors, with the exception, of the wash racks. ALL animals will be monitored to insure compliance..

Department A - Broilers

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter only one pen of broilers.
- 2. Chick orders and money must be turned in to Agricultural Science Teachers or County Extension Office by December 5, 2014 All chicks will come from the same hatch.
- 3. Each exhibitor must start with one standard order of 25 chicks. (Birds must be ordered in increments of 25 with no maximum limit. (No in-between numbers may be ordered i.e. 35). Wing band numbers originally assigned to individual exhibitors in his/her name or immediate family living in the same household and birds raised on the same premises may be pooled together. Pen selection may be made using any or all birds.
- 4. Chicks will be banded with the official county wing band at the hatchery. Each exhibitor will be assigned wing band numbers at pickup. This range of numbers will determine the exhibitor's pen.
- 5. Broilers must possess the official wing band at time of show.
- 6. All broilers will be shown in one class.
- 7. A pen of broilers will consist of three (3) birds. One broiler may be brought as an alternate.
- 8. Exhibitors must bring their own containers for feed and water.
- 9. Each exhibitor must be at his/her pen at time of judging.
- 10. All broilers must be processed and delivered within 2 weeks after the Livestock Show or the exhibitor's check will be withheld until animal is delivered, with a \$10 penalty per week until so delivered. Exhibitor must submit a signed and dated receipt for processed animals from buyer to the County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher.

Department B - Breeding Rabbits

- 1. Breeding rabbits must be owned by November 1, 2014.
- 2. Exhibitors must bring their own containers for feed and water.
- 3. No crossbreeds will be eligible.
- 4. All breeds will be shown together.
- 5. Entries will be divided into classes of does and bucks according to the following breakdown: (a) Born on or after September 15, 2014; (b) Born before September 15, 2014. No substitutions will be allowed.
- 6. Ribbons and premiums will be based on the following scale: Grand Champion \$10, Reserve Champion \$5. Class placing: first \$10, second \$5, third or lower \$3.
- 7. Judging will follow basic ARBA show guidelines.
 - Breeding rabbits may be released at 1pm on Saturday, March 28, 2015.

Department C - Meat Rabbits

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter only one pen of rabbits.
- 2. Each exhibitor must own the does by November 1, 2014 and must raise their own bunnies. Bunnies may not be purchased.
- 3. Meat rabbits must be validated with the official tattoo on February 22, 2015.
- 4. A pen of rabbits will consist of three animals, which must weigh between 10-15 pounds per pen.
- 5. Exhibitors must bring their own containers for feed and water.
- 6. All pens of rabbits will be shown in one class.
- 7. No Alternates will be allowed in barn.
- 8. Judging will follow basic ARBA show guidelines.
- 9. All rabbits must be processed and delivered within 2 weeks after the Livestock Show or the exhibitor's check will be withheld until animal is delivered, with a \$10 penalty per week until so delivered. Exhibitor must submit a signed and dated receipt for processed animals from buyer to the County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher.

Department D - Market Lambs

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter only one market lamb.
- 2. Market lambs must be validated Thursday, November 6, 2014.
- 3. Both ewe and wether lambs are eligible to show.
- 4. Lambs must be slick shorn from hocks up within 15 days of show.

- 5. Lambs must weigh at least 100 pounds.
- 6. Lambs will be divided into four classes: light, middle, light heavy and heavy. The Board of Directors may divide these classes if numbers warrant division.
- 7. Lambs must meet all Texas Animal Health Commission guidelines. (i.e. Scrapies tags in ewe lambs)
- 8. No clipping of market animals, either electrical or manual, will be allowed after arrival at the show, unless specifically authorized by the department superintendent.

Department E - Market Hogs

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter only one hog.
- 2. Market hogs must be validated on Thursday, December 11, 2014.
- 3. Gilts and barrows may enter for competition.
- 4. Gilts and barrows must weigh at least 220 pounds and not over 280 pounds.
- 5. All breeds will be shown together.
- 6. All market hogs will be divided into four classes: light, middle, light heavy, and heavy. The Board of Directors may divide these classes if numbers warrant division.
- 7. No clipping of market animals, either electrical or manual, will be allowed after arrival at the show, unless specifically authorized by the department superintendent.
- 8. Special Pee Wee Swine Showmanship. Open to potential exhibitors, (3 to 8 years of age) who reside in a Lee County school district but are too young to meet the minimal show age requirements. Each Pee Wee Showman must be accompanied by an experienced showman, 12 years of age or older. The exhibitor's parent(s) will be responsible for the young exhibitor and the pig being shown. No additional hogs may be brought in for this purpose. A special entry/release form must be signed by the parent(s).

Department F - Market Steers

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter only one market steer.
- 2. Market steers must be validated on September 14, 2014.
- 3. All steers must be dehorned with the exception of scurs.
- 4. Steers will be divided into four classes: One "Brahman crossbred" class and three weight classes for all other breeds (light, middle, and heavy). The Brahman crossbred class will be composed of American breed steers and their crosses. Steers entered in this class must show physical characteristics, which indicate a "predominance of Brahman influence". The Board of Directors may further divide these classes if numbers warrant division. A Board-appointed individual will classify the "Brahman Crossbred" cattle at weigh-in. No protests will be allowed on classification.
- 5. All steers must be weaned by validation date.
- 6. All steers must weigh a minimum of 1000 pounds at weigh in
- 7. All steers will be clipped to have no more than ¼ inch of hair on any part of the animal's body, with the exception of the tail switch, prior to arrival at the fairgrounds. No clipping of market animals, either electrical or manual, will be allowed after arrival at the show, unless specifically authorized by the department superintendent. Steers will be checked at weigh-in. No clipped hair or other extraneous materials may be glued or otherwise attached to the animal.
- 8. All market steers should be in assigned stalls from 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m..

Department G - Lee County Junior Breeding Cattle

- 1. Only registered or officially validated Crossbred (ABC or AOB) females will be eligible
- 2. Crossbred heifers must be validated in the owner's name on September 14, 2014. Registered heifers must be registered in the owner's name by November 1, 2014. All Crossbred heifers (AOB & ABC) will be shown together in one class, regardless of age, and will not be combined with the registered American, British or Exotic breeds, even if less than 3 head.
- 3. Entries will be divided into classes according to breed. Breeds with less than three head will be combined together into an American, British, or Exotic Division. Age classes will include: (a) calved after January 1, 2014; (b) calved in 2013; (c) calved in 2012 Animals born in 2011 or earlier will not be eligible. The Board of Directors may divide these classes if numbers warrant division.
- 4. Substitutions will NOT be allowed.

- 5. Ribbons and premiums will be based on the following scale: Grand Champion \$25, Reserve Champion \$20. Class placing: first \$25, second \$20, third \$15, fourth \$10, 5th and lower \$5. Breeds with only one animal will be eligible for one money.
- 6. A special award will be given to overall "Champion" and "Reserve Champion" heifer.
- 7. Heifer show is a "Blow & Go" Show. No glue, paint or otherwise attached material allowed.
- 8. No clipping of heifers, either electrical or manual, will be allowed after arrival at the show, unless specifically authorized by the department superintendent.
- 9. All breeding heifers should be in assigned stalls during the day from 9 am to 5 pm.

Department H - Market Goats

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter only one market goat.
- 2. Market goats must be validated on Thursday, November 6, 2014
- 3. Wether or doe goats of any breed or crossbred are eligible.
- 4. Goats must be dehorned or have their horns tipped back.
- 5. Goats must be trained to lead.
- 6. Goats must weigh between 70 and 125 pounds.
- 7. Goats will be divided into four weight classes: light, middle, light heavy, and heavy. The Board of Directors may divide these classes if number warrant division.
- 8. Goats must be slick shorn from hocks up with exception of the tail switch within 15 days of the show.
- 9. Goats must meet all Texas Animal Health Commission guidelines. (i.e. Scrapies tags in nannies)
- 10. No clipping of market animals, either electrical or manual, will be allowed after arrival at the show, unless specifically authorized by the department superintendent.

Department I – Open Commmercial Market Heifers

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter only one pen of open heifers.
- 2. A pen will consist of two head.
- 3. Open Commercial market heifers must be validated September 14, 2014. Each exhibitor may validate from two to five open heifers. Exhibitor must declare "open" at validation.
- 4. Heifers will be shown in two separate Divisions, Open and Bred. A Grand and Reserve Champion heifer will be selected in each Division.
- 5. Heifers may be either purebred or crossbred.
- 6. All heifers must meet all Texas Animal Health Commission requirements. Health papers will be required for the commercial market heifers and must be submitted to the department superintendent upon arrival at the show.
- 7. Heifers are required to be pregnancy diagnosed by a veterinarian within 25 days prior to check–in date of the show and BOTH must be certified to be open.
- 8. Heifers will be shown in a pen, not haltered
- 9. Signs or displays must be removed 1 hour prior to judging. They may be put back up after judging has been completed. No shavings or bedding will be allowed.
- 10 The exhibitor is responsible for furnishing feed and water equipment, which must be removed 1 hour prior to judging.
- 11 Each exhibitor must be present at the time of judging.
- 12. Commercial heifer show is a "Blow & Go" Show. No glue, paint, or otherwise attached material allowed.
- 13. Heifers must remain in their assigned stalls.
- 14. Stalls must be cleaned and approved by the department superintendent before heifers are released.
- 15. The Department Superintendent, or designated person(s), will select a commercial heifer exhibitor to receive a "Herdsman" award. The award will be based on conformity to the rules, housekeeping, neatness and presentation. There will be a Jr. and Sr. Division for the Herdsmen Award.
- 16. If an exhibitor's pen of open commercial heifers sell in the regular or freezer sale, those heifers will be ineligible to show as bred or open heifers at LCJLS the following year. ALL open heifers sold in the sale will be identified with a tattoo in the ear.

Department J – Bred Commmercial Market Heifers

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter only one pen of bred heifers.
- 2. A pen will consist of two head.
- 3. Bred Commercial market heifers must be validated September 14, 2014. Each exhibitor may validate from two to five

- heifers. Exhibitor must declare "bred" at validation.
- 4. Heifers will be shown in two separate Divisions, Open and Bred. A Grand and Reserve Champion heifer will be selected in each Division.
- 5. Heifers may be either purebred or crossbred..
- 6. All heifers must meet all Texas Animal Health Commission requirements. Health papers will be required for the commercial market heifers and must be submitted to the department superintendent upon arrival at the show.
- 7. Heifers are required to be pregnancy diagnosed by a veterinarian within 25 days prior to check–in date of the show and BOTH must be certified to be bred.
- 8. Heifers which have calved prior to judging will NOT be eligible.
- 9. Heifers will be shown in a pen, not haltered
- 10. Signs or displays must be removed 1 hour prior to judging. They may be put back up after judging has been completed. No shavings or bedding will be allowed.
- 11 The exhibitor is responsible for furnishing feed and water equipment, which must be removed 1 hour prior to judging.
- 12. Each exhibitor must be present at the time of judging.
- 13. Commercial heifer show is a "Blow & Go" Show. No glue, paint, or otherwise attached material allowed.
- 14. Heifers must remain in their assigned stalls.
- 15. Stalls must be cleaned and approved by the department superintendent before heifers are released.
- 16. The Department Superintendent, or designated person(s), will select a commercial heifer exhibitor to receive a "Herdsman" award. The award will be based on conformity to the rules, housekeeping, neatness and presentation. There will be a Jr. and Sr. Division for the Herdsmen Award.

Department K - Youth Regular Cakes

- 1. General Rules of the Lee County Junior Livestock Show apply. All youth exhibiting in these departments must be members of 4-H or F.F.A. and have attended four regular organizational meetings prior to March 1, 2015
- 2. <u>Time Schedu</u>le

Check-in: Thursday, March 26, 2015– 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 am..

Entries accepted at the YFCA exhibit building (no late entries accepted)

Judging : Thursday March 26, 2015 – beginning at 12:30 p.m.. Judging will be open to the public

- 3. Cakes will be judged on the basis of quality, texture, appearance, and flavor characteristics. Exhibitor must be present with their cakes during judging. The judge may ask the exhibitor questions concerning their cake.
- 4. All entries must be made from scratch by the exhibitor (no cake mixes or commercial frostings).
- 5. Exhibitors may enter one entry in each department: Regular Cake Department K and Decorated Cake Department L.
- 6. Cakes will be divided into three classes: chocolate, fruit, and miscellaneous. A copy of the recipe in the correct format must be attached to the entry and must also accompany the cake at check in.
- 7. The cake should be on disposable plates, etc. and covered. The Lee County Junior Livestock Show will not be responsible for any container in which food is entered.
- 8. ALL SALE CAKES become the property of the LCJLS and cannot be given to the buyer at the sale nor eaten.
- 9. ALL CAKES SOLD IN THE AUCTION MUST BE REMADE (identical cake to be remade) and delivery slip signed within 2 weeks and delivered at the date the buyer requested after the Livestock Show or the exhibitor's check will be withheld until the cake is delivered, with a \$10 penalty per week until delivery. Exhibitor must submit a signed and dated receipt for the delivered cake from the buyer to the County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher.
- 10. A complete recipe must be attached to the entry form in the following format:
 - -- The recipe should be submitted on an 81/2 x 11 sheet(s) of paper
 - a. Exhibitor Name and Club
 - b.Title of Recipe (cake)
 - c.Cake
 - 1.Ingredients
 - 2.Directions
 - d.lcing/Frosting

 - 2.Directions
 - e.Special information or Directions
 - -- The recipe should be typed.
- 11. Entry forms with recipe attached (Cake and Icing) must be turned in by January 30, 2015

- 12. There will be a \$25 entry fee for each cake in the regular and decorated cake division.
- 13. All cakes will be tasted during judging. Decisions of the judges and committee are final.
- 14. All exhibitors with entries in the sale must personally sell their own entries unless otherwise authorized by the Board of Directors prior to the sale date. A 7% commission will be collected on all cakes sold.

Department L - Youth Decorated Cakes

1. General Rules of the Lee County Junior Livestock Show apply. All youth exhibiting in these departments must be members of 4-H or F.F.A. and have attended four regular organizational meetings prior to March 1, 2014

Entries accepted at the YFCA exhibit building (no late entries accepted)

- 3. Cakes will be judged on the basis of quality, texture, appearance, and flavor characteristics. Decorated cakes will also be judged on the level of difficulty and use of variety piping techniques and other cake decorating techniques. Exhibitors must be present with their cake during judging. The judge may ask the exhibitor questions concerning their cake.
- 4. All entries must be made from scratch by the exhibitor (no cake mixes or commercial frostings).
- 5. No preformed shaped pans and kits will be allowed.
- 6. Exhibitors may enter one entry in each department: Regular Cake Department K and Decorated Cake Department L.
- 7. A copy of the recipe in the correct format must be attached to the entry and must also accompany the cake at check in.
- 8. The cake should be on disposable plates, etc. and covered. The Lee County Junior Livestock Show will not be responsible for any container in which food is entered.
- 9. ALL SALE CAKES become the property of the LCJLS and cannot be given to the buyer at the sale nor eaten.
- 10.. ALL CAKES SOLD IN THE AUCTION MUST BE REMADE (identical cake to be remade) and delivery slip signedwithin 2 weeks and delivered at the date the buyer requested after the Livestock Show or the exhibitor's check willbe withheld until cake is delivered, with a \$10 penalty per week until delivery. Exhibitor must submit a signed anddated receipt for the delivered cake from the buyer to the County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher.


