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Lee County 4-H Story

The 4-H program in Lee County is an active and growing organization. The birth of 4-H began in 1908 in Jack County, northwest of Fort Worth/Dallas metro, when County Agent Tom Marks organized a corn club with 25 boys participating.

By 1910, Lee County also had a Boys Club and were holding corn shows. In this time frame, County Agents were W. W. Campbell (1907-1909), Robert Elrod (1909 - 1910) or George Banzahf (1910-1911). Geri L. Kline, currently serves Lee County as the Agriculture and Natural Resources Agent. She has been in this role with Lee County since 2018.

Due to there not being a home economics program in the early 1900's, girls were not able to enroll. In 1933, Loraine Tidwell was appointed the first Home and Economics Agent for Lee County. Loraine was soon followed by Ina Mae Thannish, who served the County until 1935. In the nearly 100 years since, Lee County has only had 11 Home Economics Agents. The name is now Family and Community Health Agent, and Tonya Poncik, has filled the position since 2002.

Currently, there are nine 4-H Clubs in Lee County for the more than 250 4-H members. Club managers, with the assistance of the County Extension staff, instruct and guide members as they learn by participating in numerous leadership and domestic projects. Lee County offers 4-H members unlimited natural resources to explore and learn. The most valuable resource Lee County 4-H has to offer is its people. The people of Lee County support, guide and shape the 4-H program and the youth involved. Their example and guidance have enabled youth to grow within 4-H, and 4-H to grow from them.

Tonya Poncik is the Family and Community Health (FCH) County Extension Agent. She has been with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service for 23 years, serving Lee County the past 22 years; the second longest serving County Extension Agent in Lee County, behind Brown Spivey who served for 26 years. Tonya was raised on a family farm from a small town in the Texas Panhandle. Growing up she mainly showed swine through 4-H. She earned a Master of Science degree from Texas Woman's University. She works many hours preparing youth for future contests and events and even though she is a FCH County Extension Agent, you can still find her helping out at the livestock shows.

Tonya states, "Winning is the icing on the cake, but most rewarding is seeing youth transition into a confident leader."

Geri Kline is the Agriculture and Natural Resources Agent for Lee County. She has been with the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service for 8 years, serving in Lee County for going on 6 years. Geri grew up in Bastrop County and 4-H. She earned a Master of Science degree from Tarleton State University. She is an avid hunter and loves teaching youth and adults about agriculture and the outdoors. "Without agriculture you would have nothing to eat and nothing to wear. Agriculture affects everything," stated Geri.

Welcome to the Lee County 4-H Program. The 4-H Program is a youth development program of the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension. Our purpose is to provide members the opportunities to learn, develop life skills and form attitudes, enabling them to become self-directing, productive and contributing members of society.

Our program provides opportunities and personal development of all the young people involved. Additional project education is available from 4-H Leaders and Extension Agents throughout the 4-H year.

4-H is a FAMILY AFFAIR. A member selects various 4-H projects with the help of their parents. Parents then advise, counsel and assist their member in taking care of, constructing or being involved in the project.

A brief overview of many the opportunities are provided in this handbook, additional information can be found on the Lee County 4-H website.

We look forward to your participation in the Lee County 4-H Program.

Enrollment for the 2023-2024 year opens on 4-H Online beginning August 15.

• Youth members are required to pay a \$25.00 participation fee if enrolled by October 31. The fee increases to \$30.00 on November 1.

A youth that is 8 years old and going into the 3rd grade must wait until September 1 to enroll for proper fees to be accessed.

The Texas 4-H year officially starts on September 1.

- Clover Kids (Kindergarten through 2nd Grade) pay just \$10.00.
- Adults pay a \$10.00 volunteer applicant fee.

Enrollment for the next school year begins August 15.

Registering before August 15, will be enrollment to the previous school year, and does <u>Not</u> carry over. You would then need to enroll again, after August 15, for the current school year.

AGE DIVISIONS

Clover Kids: Kindergarten – 2nd Grade Juniors: 3rd grade** – 5th grade

Intermediates: 6th grade – 8th grade Seniors: 9th grade – 12th grade

In some contests, Juniors and Intermediates are combined into one group and referred to as Juniors (example: Major Show Livestock Judging and most horse events).

Clover Kids do not compete. They are allowed to participate in age appropriate learning experiences, but not competitions. The enrollment fee for Clover Kids is \$10. The six projects that Clover Kids can participate in are: rabbits, food & nutrition, health & personal safety, photography, robotics, horticulture, dog care & training, sport fishing, fashion & interior design and computer science.

** 3rd Graders should wait until September 1 before registering, so their 4-H age will correctly calculate as an 8 year old.

To be a member in Lee County 4-H, youth and adults must register in 4-H Online and join at least one local 4-H club. Clubs in Lee County are listed on the inside front cover. Any adult should that would like to help the 4-H program in any capacity should register in 4-H Online. Enrollment must be repeated at the beginning of each new 4-H year.

3rd Graders should wait until September 1 before registering, so their 4-H age will correctly calculate as an 8 year old.

4-H CALENDER

The 4-H year follows the school calendar; beginning September 1 and ending August 31. Enrollment remains open throughout the year. 4-H members must re-enroll each September 1. Member participation fees are \$25 for those enrolling between September 1 and October 31. Clover Kids are \$10. Beginning November 1, and for the continuation of the 4-H year, the participation fee will be \$30. Adult volunteer enrollment is \$10 per year.

4-H NEWS & UPDATES

Updates and resources are periodically posted to our social media accounts and sent in emails. Information will also be sent to Club Managers, who then can share the information with their club members.

ATTENDANCE EXPECTATIONS

4-H members are expected to attend scheduled monthly club meetings. If unable to attend, please let your club manager know. Exhibitors who plan to enter the Lee County Junior Livestock Show must meet the attendance requirement as set out in the Show's Rules. PROJECT EXPERIENCES

4-H members participate in planned 4-H project, learning experiences under the guidance of a 4-H certified project leader or trained teacher.

TEXAS EDUCATION AGENCY RULES

4-H has been recognized by the Texas Education Agency as a legitimate school-related extracurricular organization. 4-H members may apply for excused absences in order to participate in 4-H activities. It is the responsibility of the local school district to determine whether or not any student is eligible and may be excused from classes to participate in any extracurricular event or activity. 4-H members are not automatically excused upon request, but are subject to all regulations of the Texas Education Agency and their local school district as they may apply to extracurricular participation. Specifics related to eligibility during Fall/Spring breaks, summer vacation, and holidays can be found on the University Interscholastic League (UIL) website at: https://www.uiltexas.org/policy/tea-uil-side-by-side. All 4-H youth, including youth in public, private, or home school must adhere to the guidelines regarding competitive activities.

Consistent with University Interscholastic League (U.I.L.) rules, the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program has adopted a three (3) school-week waiting period upon change in status of school enrollment (i.e. from public to home, public to private, public to public, private to public, private to home, private to private, home to public, or home to private) before the 4-H member is eligible for extracurricular activity.

Schools will be notified (by letter) from the Extension Office as to what members will be participating, as well as dates and times that they are to miss classes.

EXCUSED ABSENCES FROM SCHOOL

4-H members participating in <u>an approved 4-H contest/activity</u>, which is approved by the local school board, under the direction of the Extension Agents, will be considered in attendance and will be reported present at the school's discretion. **Families are responsible for knowing the number of days allowed by their school for excused absences while participating in extracurricular activities.** Schools will be notified (by letter) from the Extension Office as to what members will be participating, as well as dates and times that they are to miss classes.



The project is the heart of the 4-H program. A wide variety of projects are available for members. Project opportunities vary depending upon the county and club. A member or group can also select an area of interest that is not officially listed as a 4-H project, and plan and conduct a self-directed project in that area of interest.

Through carefully selected projects, members learn to manage their resources, assume responsibility and acquire the knowledge and skills necessary for everyday living.


A project may extend over a short period of time or for several years. "Learn-by-doing" is the most important aspect of a project, not time. Making, growing, caring for, observing and participating are all active learning processes involved in 4-H projects.

From a member's viewpoint, projects may be fun, help develop skills, offer an opportunity to assume responsibility, to make a profit, save money or explore interests and careers. Projects also offer a chance to do things with friends.

Leaders and parents may see the project as a means to create more interest in daily tasks, strengthen family and community ties, develop knowledge and skills of members, explore possible career opportunities, enhance positive self-concept, develop the ability to organize, plan and make decisions.

The Project Group

Members have the opportunity to participate in group learning and peer teaching, since sharing skills and experiences often provides them with greater learning opportunities. Group participation can also motivate members to follow through with commitments. Members are usually involved in group learning through their participation in a project group.

Project group meetings are designed so members acquire subject-matter knowledge and skills, as well as general life skills.

How are projects conducted?

Projects are conducted through various activities and events such as:

- 1. 4-H community club meetings.
- 2. Project group workshops.
- 3. Field trips to tour local businesses, various agencies, as well as other member's projects.
- 4. Family activity at home.
- 5. Individual work toward project goals.
- 6. Online learning.
- 7. Community Service.
- 8. Competition

Project learning experiences should be 20-30 minutes in length and have a minimum of six learning experiences.

How are projects selected?

Each member selects a project that fulfills their interest, home situation and ability. All projects provide useful experiences.

It is suggested that first year 4-H members select one project their first year, additional projects should be added each year of the 4-H career to show growth. For example, broilers or rabbits make a great project for beginning a livestock project. After a couple of years, the member can advance to a larger animal such as a goat or lamb.

If members talk with their parents about projects, their choices will have meaning and importance to the entire family. Factors to consider when selecting a project include:

The Member

- What are the member's interests?
 Many times, a member doesn't know if they would like a project without first researching and inquiring about a project from other members.
- Is the member exploring projects that will offer new areas of interest?

- What are the members' ages and abilities (physical and mental)?
- What new abilities can the member develop by choosing a specific project?
- How much time does the member have? How much time does the project require?
- What season of the year does most of the activity occur?
- If the member chooses an animal project, is the space required and equipment needed adequately available?
- Approximately how much will the project cost?

The Family

- Does the project fit into the home situation?
- Does the family have an interest in the project selected?

The Club or Group

- How many members of the group wish to try similar projects?
- Is Leadership available for each member to have a successful experience?

The Neighborhood or Community

- Does the project fulfill a community interest or need?
- Can the neighborhood, community or county provide additional support or resources on this project?

Members are more likely to have success with a project(s) suited to their needs, abilities, interest, and family situations. A positive experience can help members develop their sense of self-worth, a willingness to share their experiences with others, and their willingness to try more things.

Success Builds Success

Good youth development programs do not just happen. It takes a team with the combined effort of parents and volunteers along with the guidance of Extension youth development professionals to establish a good 4-H program which contributes to the ultimate development of our youth. If this team is to be successful, then the parents must become "**regular players**" not "**bench riders**".



Why parent participation?

Through research and experience, a number of positive efforts on 4-H, 4-H clubs and 4-H members can be attributed to active parent participation.

- Active parent participation can strengthen and broaden the 4-H program in local unit or in any county.
- 4-H work would be totally impossible without the active support of interested parents.
- It has been found that youth do better club work when parents show interest, not only by work but also by deeds.
- Extending a helping or encouraging hand to you is one of the finest ways you can express affection to your child and other youth.
- 4-H is a family affair offering parents many opportunities to participate in a program with their child and build family unity.
- When parental support is positive, the chances are good for the club to become stronger, larger and more active.
- In clubs where parental support is strong, individual club members receive more personal attention and guidance from leaders and parents.
- Club activities and events will develop and expand with the added support of parents.
- 4-H has a positive influence on the lives of thousands of boys and girls. This happens only when parents care enough to share their time, efforts and talents.

4-H Brings the Family Together

Family unity increases from planning, sharing and working together. When a family works together as a team, it strengths the talents, skills, and worth of each family member so they can be developed and be appreciated. With love and understanding, patience and counsel, a parent can offer their child a solid start in a pleasant and beneficial experience; the family then becomes a team.

What can parents do to support and/or help in the 4-H program?

- Learn what 4-H is all about (purposes, objective, etc.).
- Exhibit a genuine interest and enthusiasm in 4-H and in your child.
- Encourage participation in 4-H activities; participation stimulates interest and enthusiasm.
- Assist your child in selecting a project they will enjoy, a project they have the ability to accomplish, and one for which you can help furnish facilities, financing, needed materials, and guidance.
- Provide encouragement. Help in project work with recordkeeping, demonstrations, judging, and completion of attempted work and leadership responsibilities.

- Provide transportation for members to local club meetings, county events and various activities.
- Attend club meetings with your child.
- Get informed about "what's going on" and continue to keep informed.
- Provide a meeting place for the project group. When possible, assist leaders and club by providing refreshments or other help.
- Volunteer to be a project leader. All adults have abilities that would greatly assist the 4-H program.
- Serve on a committee to help plan and conduct special club activities and events.

Judging Contests

Three separate contests which improve decision making skills; making individual decisions and supporting them with oral statements or written reasons, while:

- MEAT: learn to identify/evaluate meat cuts of beef, swine and sheep; critically evaluate meat cuts

Record Books

Record keeping is a valuable skill taught to members of the Texas 4-H program. Members are encouraged to keep project records and have these records reviewed annually by submitting a Texas 4-H Record Book.

Why is it important you keep a record of your 4-H activities? Because, by recording your activities you can remember all the fun you've had so far and set future goals!

Keeping records of 4-H projects could help you when you apply for college scholarships too! 4-H Record Books are books you make to record your annual projects.

The primary purpose of completing a Record Book are for a young person to develop the skills necessary to set goals, work toward achieving those goals, reflect on their experiences, and set new and higher goals for themselves.

A secondary benefit is to prepare young people for the process of completing quality academic scholarship applications. The completed 4-H Record Book must be submitted to the Lee County Extension office by **May 3, 2024**.

Each 4-H'er submitting a Record Book at the County level are recognized at the Annual Awards Program in August.

First place books in each age division will advance to District level competition. Senior 4-H'ers who place first in District advance to the State Record Book competition.

QUALITY COUNTS is designed to teach young people the importance of good character in carrying out livestock projects, and in every aspect of their lives.

QUALITY COUNTS helps youth exhibitors learn the importance of using proper livestock management practices so that food quality and safety are preserved.

Youth are able to go online to take the test and become verified. A verification number will need to be provided at the time of making an official entry into a Texas major livestock show.

Thus, youth will need to have completed and passed the on-line test before the major livestock show's entry deadline. A passing score has been determined to be 80%.

Exhibitors will need an individual email addresses. Emails can't be shared within the same family.

Exhibitors must be verified once as a Junior (grades 3-5), once as an Intermediate (grades 6-8) and once again as a Senior (grades 9-12).

Major Livestock Shows

Major Livestock Show projects of steers, market lambs, meat goats and swine must be validated and ear-tagged in the months of June, October and November. Ear tags for the major shows must be ordered prior to tagging dates. Market poultry orders are due in September and October for major livestock shows.

** During **Major Show Entry Day**, Agent and staff will be on hand to answer questions and assist as needed.

Major Show entries may be brought to the Extension office during regular business.

Each exhibitor must have:

- current 4-H enrollment
- Quality Counts Verification Number
- access to the exhibitor's Social Security #

Prepare to bring a separate check for each Show's entry fee. Multiple family members may be included on the same Show's entry fee check.

The Lee County 4-H office has a few items, available for loan on a short-term basis:

Large and Small Livestock Clippers

- user must own the required type of blades
- reserve in advance
- must return clippers free of all hair, fur, oil, feces and other debris
- screws, bolts and all parts must remain intact



Small Stock Scale (goats, lambs, swine)

- check-out time, limited to 24-hours; or as arranged at check-out
- reserve in advance
- must return scale cleaned of any animal hair and feces
- must have vehicle equipped with hitch
- must be able to hitch trailer by yourself or have a helper accompany you

Trim Chutes (large and small livestock)

- check-out time is limited to 24-hours; or as arranged at check-out
- must return chute free of all hair, fur, feces and other debris

Speaker System

(Club meeting use only; no exceptions)

- small system, good for groups of 50 and under
- system may be checked out only for Club Meetings
- system must be returned the day after Club Meeting
